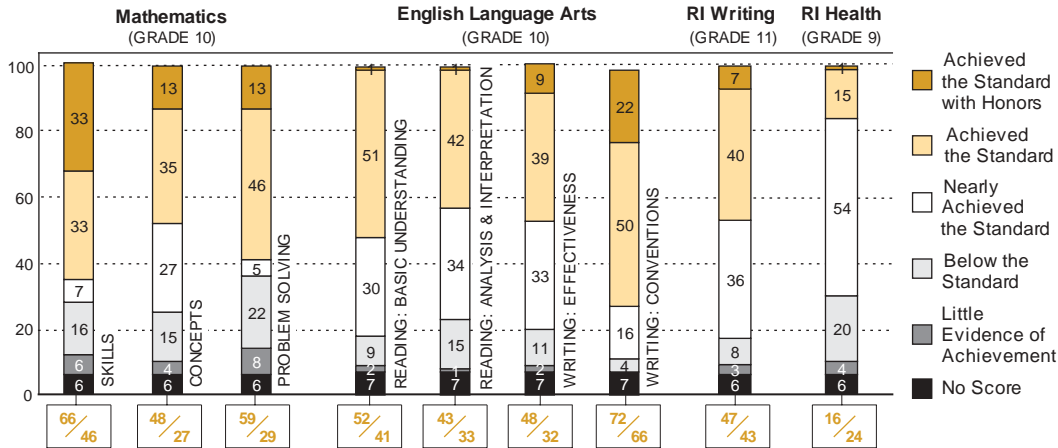

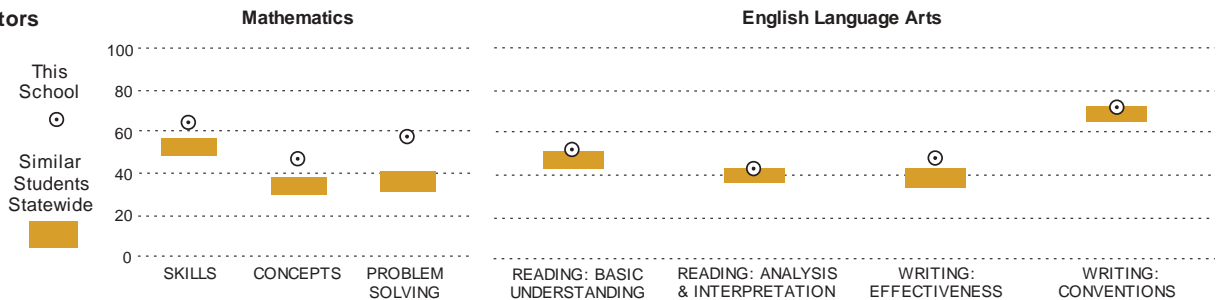

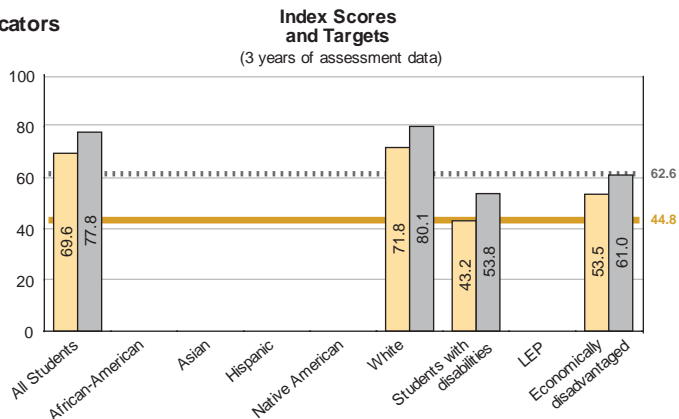
2003 Value-Added Indicators

Percentage of students who met or exceeded the standard compared with the percentage of similar students statewide



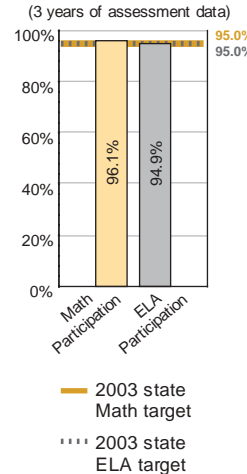

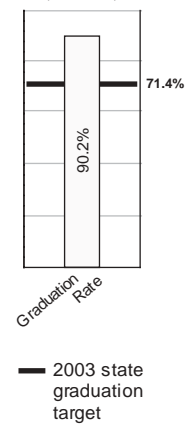

Participation Rates and Targets



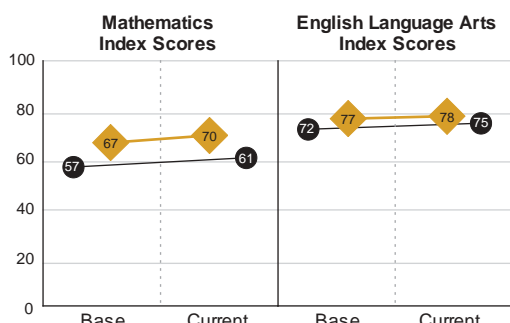
Graduation Rate and Target

 Current: School years 2001-2003



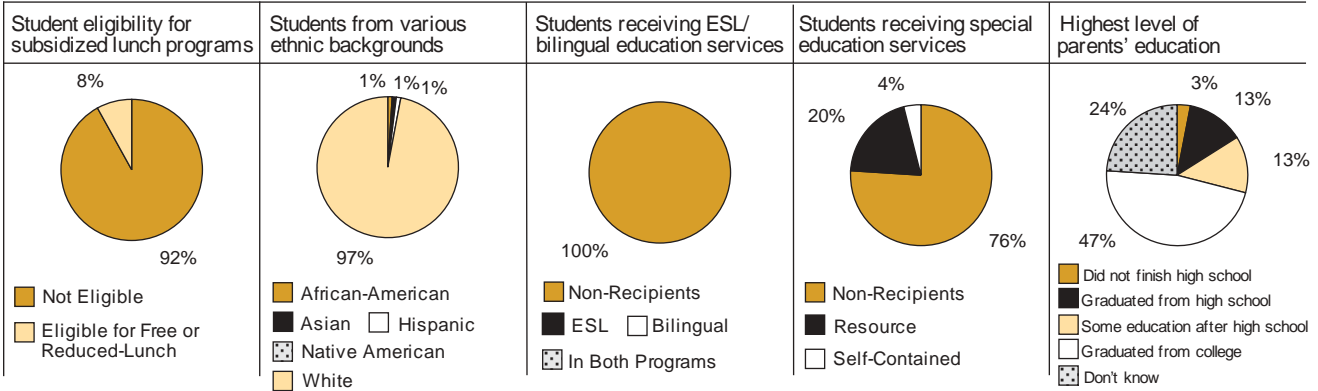

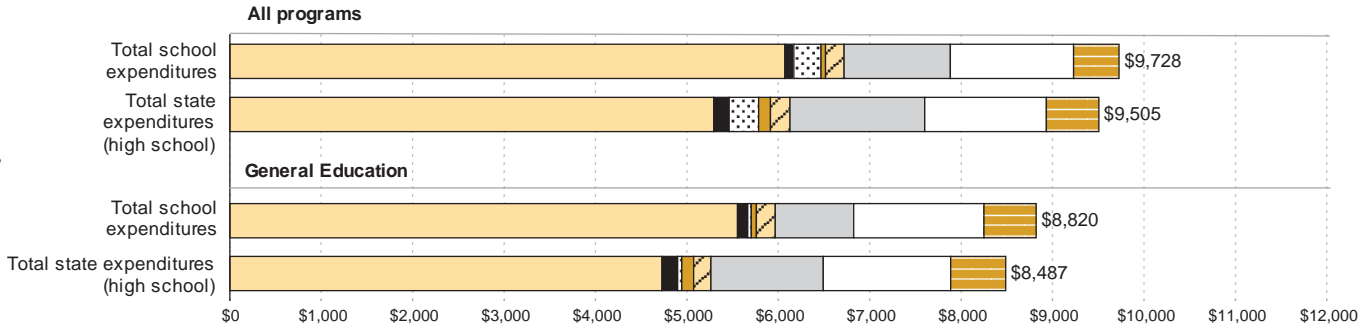

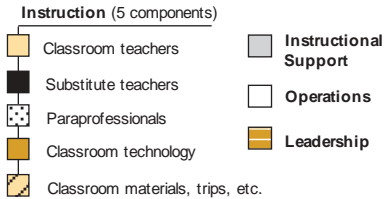

Key for school expenditures areas

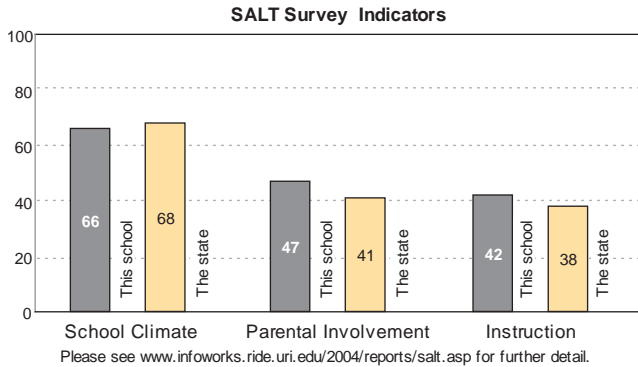


Per pupil expenditures by program

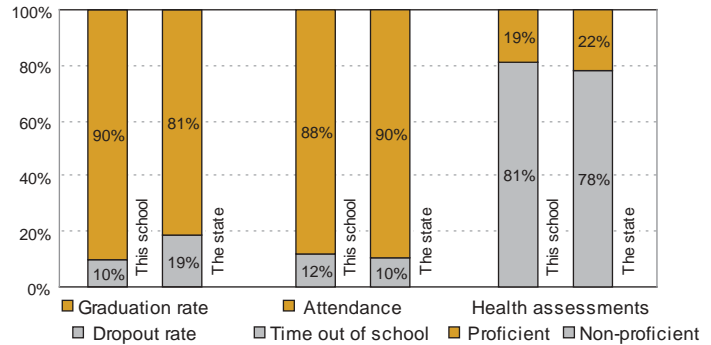

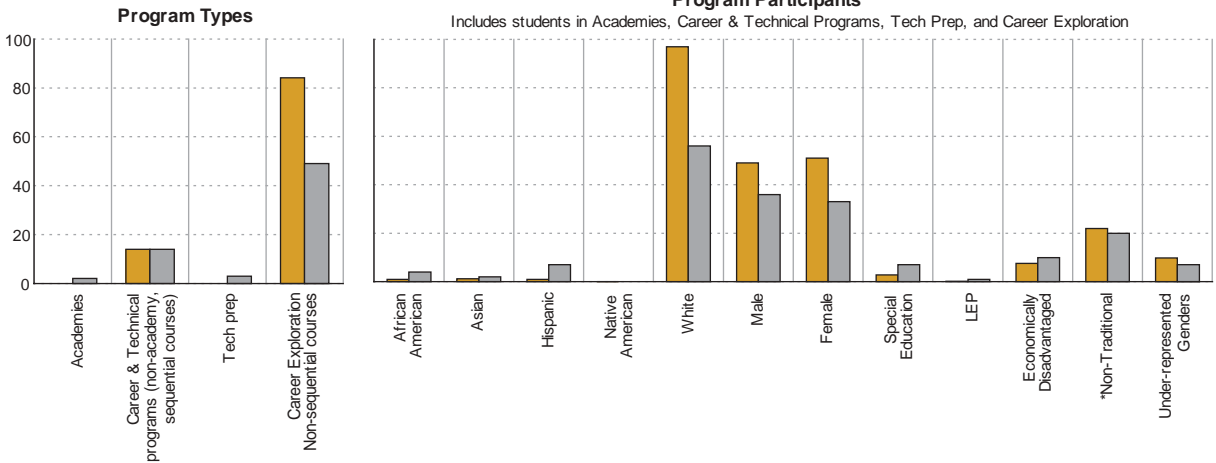

Participation of all students in School-to-Career Education

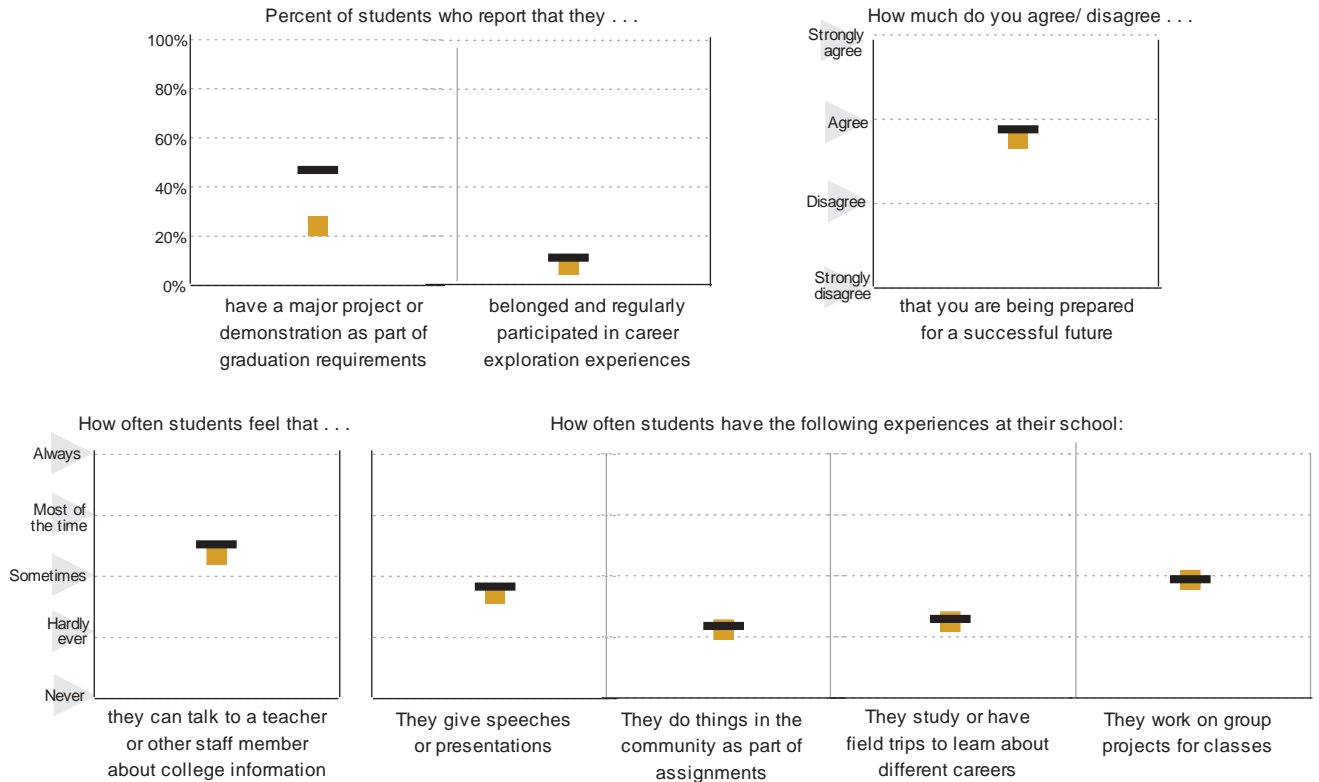
